The Youth Leadership class is going really well. With the help of their mentors, the young people

have been working on setting short and long term goals for their spiritual lives, their families, their education and their work. Melvin, a veterinary student from the village of Pueblo Nuevo, posted in his dorm one of the handouts he had received in the leadership class... the handout was on decision-making and some of the other students in his dorm asked to make copies of it. Svellana, a student from Tipitapa, relates that her church members have remarked on the change they see in the young people who are participating in the leadership class.... they have noted that they are taking a much more active role in church.

The youth are meeting at the camp once a month. Many travel from remote areas, some as far as 8 hours by bus. Most of them are college students living on a limited budget. They are responsible for paying their bus fare one way. We pay for the return ticket as well as their meals and lodging. (The students do all the meal planning as well as the shopping.) Each of these weekends costs \$300. We are asking for donations toward this
